

SOCIAL COHESION

Social Cohesion is what drives us at Education Africa and in particular when planning this festival. Social Cohesion does not just happen! We all owe it to our beloved country to make this happen! The International Marimba & Steelpan Festival is a true reflection of what South Africa could be like, living and working in harmony. Not only is this regarded as the largest festival of its kind in the world, but it is the largest and most inclusive school event in the country where children from all social strata as well as children with disabilities get together on one platform to perform for and compete against each other.

This Festival is known for its incredible spirit, and we were not disappointed again this year after three years of virtual Festivals. To hear everyone cheering every band that performed was music to my ears. This was evident from the first note of the Festival played by DPHS to the very last one played by Michaelhouse!



INCLUSIVITY

Being fully inclusive we had 2 special needs bands competing in the Festival this year. There was a deaf band from MCK Special School Marimba Hub and the newly formed Ithembelihle Marimba Hub from Primrose, Germiston for children with physical as well as other special needs.



In addition, Rose Moloi, our Marimba Hub teacher and manager at the Dominican School for Deaf Learners in Hammanskraal gave two very informative workshops on how to teach marimbas to deaf learners. According to many who attended her workshops, this was extremely interesting, inspiring and enlightening.

In anticipation of next year's Festival, we invited our brand-new Marimba Hubs for children with disabilities to come and watch as well as participate in the workshops on offer. These were the Sibonile School for Blind Children, St Vincent's School for Deaf Children and the Adelaide Tambo School for children with physical disabilities. We also had children from the Dominican School for Deaf Learners attend the Festival as visitors.

THE FESTIVAL

Marimbas and steelpans started arriving at the Festival from Friday midday this year. The facilities at St Dominic's Catholic School for Girls are ideal for the Festival. The large Jubilee Centre with built-in seating makes for a wonderful, comfortable venue.

By the time the Festival started at 7:45am on Saturday morning there were about 245 marimbas and over 25 steelpans on the floor.



PARTICIPATION

5 Countries were registered to attend the Festival: South Africa, Zimbabwe, Nigeria, Lesotho and Botswana. However, due to a lack of funds, we finally only had participants from South Africa, Zimbabwe and Botswana. Originally 95 institutions registered but 82 arrived with over 2300 participants who performed in 286 performances. Of the 7 adjudicators we had 1 from the USA, 2 from Cape Town, 3 from Gauteng and 1 from Zimbabwe.

The festival had three main components: THE MAIN LIVE COMPETITIONS, a small ONLINE COMPETITION FOR SOUTH AFRICAN BANDS ONLY and the FRINGE events.

MAIN EVENT

At the main event in the Jubilee Centre, marimba and steelpan competitions took place throughout the two days where bands in different sections and age categories competed for the much-coveted trophies and wonderful sponsored prizes. In addition, there were 13 online entries in 3 categories that were adjudicated at the Festival.

As is our normal practice, our 6 adjudicators were put in 2 teams and alternated between adjudicating and presenting lecture-demonstrations and performances. This allowed the participants the opportunity to experience first-hand the outstanding expertise of the adjudicators. Our 7th adjudicator was part of the composition competitions.

The adjudicators were **Karolyn Stonefelt** from the **USA**, **Chris Timbe** from **Zimbabwe**, **Bronwyn Clacherty** from **Cape Town**, **Chantal Willie-Petersen** from **Gauteng**, **Ludumo Magangane** from **Gauteng**, **Kgomotso Le Roux** from **Gauteng** and **Dave Reynolds** who was the chief adjudicator in the composition category from **Cape Town**.

Dr. Karolyn Stonefelt is a State University of New York Distinguished Professor and Director of Percussion Studies in the School of Music at Fredonia. She is also a performer and lifelong student. She gave two workshops on "Fun with Amadinda rhythms".



Chris Timbe is from Zimbabwe and is a highly motivated and versatile person with a vision to contribute to National and International human development through the dissemination of information, skills, and attitudes using Music, Dance, and Compositions as powerful tools. He gave two workshops on "learning to play the mbira".



Dr Bronwen Clacherty is a lecturer in African Music at the South African College of Music in Cape Town. She is an Academic, Percussionist, African Instrumentalist, Community Musician and Composer. She gave two workshops for teachers on "Approaches to song writing".



Chantal Willie-Petersen is currently a lecturer and PhD candidate at WITS University where she is focusing her research on coloured identity, African feminism and historic sound. She is an academic, performer and composer. She gave two workshops with Dave Reynolds on the "process of collaboration".

Ludumo Magangane is a highly accomplished musician and conductor with a diverse range of skills and experiences. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree, a Student Teachers' Diploma and a Bachelor of Education degree. He taught the massed item that was sung with the marimbas and steelpans and he gave a workshop on a Sesotho traditional song.



Kgomotso Le Roux has over 20 years of working experience in the music and arts sector. She has worked as a performer, arts administrator, music producer and holds a Bachelor of Music Degree in Ethnomusicology. She gave two workshops on "how to apply for funding through the NAC".



DAVE REYNOLDS is well-known to this Festival as a presenter of Steelpan Workshops. He is South Africa's leading Steelpan player and has performed and recorded all over the world. He was the chief adjudicator in the composition category. He gave two workshops with Chantal Willie-Petersen on the "process of collaboration".



THE FRINGE EVENTS

As this Festival is the ultimate EDUTAINMENT event, our ever-popular **Fringe** events consisted of 90 workshops in various disciplines and were very popular with the participants and visitors to the Festival. The **open workshops** included gumboot dancing by **Mpho Kunene**; Steelpan workshops by **Dave Reynolds**, Hip hop and Afro fusion dancing with **Jermaine Johnson**, how to apply for funding from the NAC with **Kgomotso Le Roux**, Sesotho and Setswana traditional dances with **Gregory Lediga**, drama games with **Nolwazi Ngcobo**, creating new music and the process of collaboration with **Dave Reynolds** and **Chantal Willie-Petersen** and let's sing a traditional SeSotho song with **Ludumo Magangane**.

We also had marimba workshops in beginner, intermediate and advanced levels presented by: **Bradley Lithgow, Thandi Dube, Hastings Nyirenda, Rose Moloi, Charmaine Holloway** and **Tarisai Muchineripi**. We had djembe workshops in beginner, intermediate and advanced levels presented by members of the **PACD**. In addition, we had mbira workshops with **Chris Timbe**, song-writing workshops with **Bronwyn Clacherty**, fun with amadinda rhythms with **Karolyn Stonefelt**, fun with science for 6-10 years olds by **Bev Wilson** and a creative workshop for 3-7 year olds with **Catherine Sweetie**.



THE MASSED EVENTS

The massed interactive djembe event was presented by **members of PACD** and the massed marimba and steelpan event was presented by **Joan Lithgow** with **Ludumo Magangane** who trained the ad hoc choir.

There was also a vibrant flea market at the Festival as well as many food stalls.



COMPOSITION COMPETITIONS

In addition to the competitions that were playing out in the Main Venue there was also a COMPOSITION COMPETITION in two age categories. All six adjudicators plus Dave Reynolds adjudicated this competition.

There were 3 entries in total received: 2 entries in the young adults' section and 1 in the school-going section. Reece Ronaldson won the young adult's section with a close second by Rorisang Motsamai. The winner of the school-going section was Mufaro Mutsvanguma from Westville Senior Primary School. These compositions are always judged "blind", so the adjudicators had no idea who they were judging!

Besides sponsorship for which we are incredibly grateful, from the Australian High Commission to allow children with disabilities to participate in the Festival, we received no additional financial support.
